< Stop 1: Visitor Center

- In what building is the Visitor Center located?
- Name two other offices located in the same building.

Stop 2: Campbell Hall > (Please DO NOT enter the building.)

- With 860 seats, Campbell Hall is the largest lecture facility on campus. What types of classes are offered in Campbell Hall?
- Besides lectures, what other events take place in the hall? (Hint – look at the kiosk located in front of the building.)
- The large black sculpture south of Campbell Hall represents what letters? >



< Stop 3: Davidson Library

- What is the name of the computerized “card catalog” that students use to find books?
- What building do you see across from the Library when enjoying the amazing view from the Eighth Floor toward the ocean?

Stop 4: Santa Rosa Residence Hall > (You may request to see a model room.)

- How many residential halls are there on campus?
- Typically how many students are in each room? How many on each floor?
- How do students check out equipment in the recreation room?



Stop 5: University Center >

- a. What do UCSB students and staff call the University Center for short?
- b. Where is the Post Office located?
- c. Where is the Community Housing Office located?



d. Go to the Bookstore on the main level. Where are the textbooks located?

e. How are the textbooks organized?

f. Pick a class and find out how many books a student would have to buy for the class and what the books would cost.

g. Storke Tower is the concrete structure located across the plaza from the University Center. What offices are located under the tower?



< Stop 6: Recreation Center

a. What do UCSB students and staff call the Recreation Center for short?

b. How many swimming pools are there at the Center? How many basketball courts?

Stop 1: a. Student Affairs and Administrative Services Building (SAASB). b. Registrar, Billing Office (BARC), Cashier, Financial Aid, Summer Sessions, Human Resources, Accounting and Financial Services, Early Academic Outreach, Student Information Systems and Technology. **Stop 2:** a. Large survey-type courses as well as popular elective courses. Some examples include History of Western Civilization, Art History, and Sociology 152: Human Sexuality, just to name a few. b. Dance and theater performances, movie screenings, poetry readings, discussions with prominent authors and actors, etc. c. UCSB. **Stop 3:** a. Pegasus (electronic card catalog system) b. Psychology Department building **Stop 4:** a. Usually two students per room and approximately 40 students per floor that would share a common bathroom consisting of several showers, stalls, and sinks. b. There are seven residential halls on campus. c. During the school year, students borrow the equipment from the residence hall front desk by leaving their Access Card (campus identification card) with the attendant until the equipment is returned. **Stop 5:** a. UCen b. Down the stairs on the bottom level. c. Up the stairs on the top level. d. Bottom level. e. Alphabetically by department, Anthropology through Zoology. f. Some classes require one textbook, others require multiple books. Prices range from \$1.99 to \$99 or more. g. Daily Nexus (the student newspaper), KCSB (the campus radio station), and La Cumbre Yearbook. **Stop 6:** a. The RecCen. b. There are two Olympic-sized swimming pools and two basketball courts, plus two fitness centers, two gymnasiums, racquetball and squash courts, a Jacuzzi, a three-story rock-climbing wall, a multi-purpose indoor court used for indoor soccer, roller-hockey and basketball, and two outdoor soccer fields.
